

Causes of the American Revolution Creating a Children's Book

Project: You will work with a group of your peers to create a children's book explaining the causes of the American Revolution. You will be sharing your book with a group of students at the elementary school.

Driving Question: What would it take for you to be angry enough with your government to storm the White House?

Requirements

- Each group member will research 3-4 key topics
- Fill out a graphic organizer for each topic researched
- Cite the source of your information
- Write a page explaining the event using <u>elementary language</u>
- Create illustrations that match the text for each event
- Make a table of contents for easy
- Show your knowledge of vocabulary by creating a glossary at the end of your book
- Put the key events in chronological order by making a timeline to add to your book

• Explain the meaning of all the vocabulary words

- _____ All sentences have correct end markings
 - _____ Spelling: check book for spelling errors
